GULTEN TEPE:

Welcome to the ICANN79 GAC Opening Plenary Session being held on Saturday, 2nd of March at 1300 UTC. Recognizing that these are public sessions and other members of the ICANN community may be in attendance, the GAC leadership and support staff encourage all of you who are GAC members to type your name and affiliation in the participation chat bot. This is to keep accurate attendance records.

To ensure transparency of participation in ICANN's multi-stakeholder model, we ask that you sign into Zoom sessions using your full name. If you would like to ask a question or make a comment, please type it in the chat by starting and ending your sentence with a question or comment as indicated in the chat. The feature is located at the bottom of your Zoom window. Interpretation for GAC sessions include all six UN languages and Portuguese. Participants can select the language they wish to speak or listen to by clicking on the interpretation icon on the Zoom toolbar.

If you wish to speak, please raise your hand. Once the session facilitator calls upon you, please unmute yourself and take the floor. With that, I would like to leave the floor to GAC Chair, Nicolas Caballero. Over to you, Nico.

NICOLAS CABALLERO:

Thank you very much, Gulten. Good morning, ladies and gentlemen. It is my great pleasure and honor to welcome you to the opening ceremony of the ICANN79 Community Forum in San Juan, Puerto Rico. This is the third time that this beautiful island hosts an ICANN public meeting. And we are delighted to be here again. Puerto Rico has a rich and diverse history, culture, and heritage that we can all appreciate and learn from. As we gather here today, I would like to pay tribute to some historical figures of this country, as I usually do every time we go to a different country, since the beginning of my tenure, at least.

So, in 1581, Juan Ponce de Leon II, the grandson of the conquistador Juan Ponce de Leon, studied an eclipse and its effects on the island and was able to establish the exact geographical coordinates of San Juan with his observations. Later on, during the 19th century, the economies of many countries in the world suffered from the spread of crop failures. Puerto Rico, whose economy depended heavily on its agriculture, felt the effects of some of the crop diseases.

So, scientists such as Agustin Stahl, Fermin Tanguiz, and Fernando López-Tuero conducted investigations and experiments in the fields of agriculture, botany, ethnology, and zoology, helping Puerto Rico's



agricultural industry to recover. We are honored to be in their homeland, and we thank the local hosts, the US government, and the ICANN community for making this event possible. Ladies and gentlemen, this year marks also the 25th anniversary of the GAC, the Governmental Advisory Committee, one of the key components of the ICANN multi-stakeholder model. The GAC serves, as everybody knows, as the voice of governments and international governmental organizations in ICANN, providing advice on issues of public policy, especially where there may be an interaction between ICANN's activities or policies and national laws or international agreements.

Over the past 25 years, the GAC has grown in size, diversity, and influence, reflecting the increasing importance and complexity of the issues related to the domain name system and the internet governance. The GAC now has 182 member governments and 39 observer organizations, representing all regions and perspectives of the world. The GAC has also produced 77 communiques as of today, numerous public comments, and many pieces of direct correspondence, providing valuable information and advice to the ICANN board and community. The GAC's achievements are remarkable, but they are also accompanied by many challenges.

The DNS industry and the internet ecosystem are constantly evolving, driven by the rapid pace of technological innovation and the changing needs and expectations of the users. Some of the current challenges, just to name a few, include the encryption of DNS messages, the centralization of the DNS infrastructure, the security and stability of the DNS, the protection of human rights and public interests, and the coordination and cooperation with other stakeholders. These

challenges require us to work together, to share our knowledge and experience, to respect our diversity and commonality, and to seek solutions that are inclusive, transparent, and accountable. This is the essence of the ICANN multi-stakeholder model, and this is the spirit of the GAC.

Ladies and gentlemen, I would like to conclude by extending again a very warm welcome to all of you, whether you're participating in person or online. I hope we will have a productive and enjoyable meeting and look forward to engaging with you in the coming days. Thank you for your attention, and now it is my privilege and pleasure to give the floor to Mrs. Susan Chalmers, my distinguished colleague from the USA, who will deliver some opening remarks on behalf of the host country, the USA. Susan, the floor is yours.

SUSAN CHALMERS:

Thank you, Chair. On behalf of the United States government, it is my pleasure to welcome colleagues from around the world to San Juan, Puerto Rico. This is the third ICANN meeting to be held in Puerto Rico, and it is easy to see why we keep coming back. In Puerto Rico, the coffee is as strong as the mofongo is delicious. At the outset of this meeting, I was thinking to reflect on a positive trend that I have noticed over the past few meetings.

GAC participation is increasing. Over the past year or so, we have seen deeper engagement by a diversity of countries in GAC meetings, a more polyphonic contribution to GAC views and positions. New GAC representatives are increasingly finding their voices at the mic and contributing fresh perspectives. Governments coming to participate in



the GAC at ICANN to address topics, they are coming to address topics that matter to their citizens back home and making their participation more meaningful by driving discussion forward within the GAC on different topics. We've addressed issues like cybercrime, like mobile phishing schemes and malware. We address this through our DNS Abuse work. Different governments raised awareness about ccTLD issues that matter to them in Hamburg. Some view the state of the IPV4 market and deployment of IPV6 as a priority.

These are topics that we as governments can address at ICANN because ICANN plays a direct role in these topics. And GAC leadership's work on strategic planning is very exciting because it will direct our work with more focus and collaboration. So, I find this to be all very energizing, but to be more effective in our work, the GAC could engage in a deeper and more meaningful way with the different constituencies within ICANN. So, during today's capacity development workshop, we will focus on ccTLDs and regional internet registries. We will engage directly and informally with representatives from these constituencies, as well as with ICANN staff on the role that it plays in ccTLDs and in the global allocation of the internet's numbers.

We also have formal bilateral meetings this week with these constituencies for the first time and in a very long while. This is an opportunity to connect with the people who actually work to deploy and maintain the internet's global resources in their day to day. So, I hope that you stay with us in the GAC room today for the capacity development workshop. Just as we did in Washington, DC, we will organize language breakout sessions this afternoon. Yes, we want to multilingualize the DNS through IDNs and universal acceptance, but we



also want to multilingualize the GAC itself. And today gives us the opportunity to spark ideas and conversation, to create new relationships and to build upon existing ones and to foster the energy that will carry us through the week ahead. So, in closing, bienvenidos Puerto Rico and let's have a great meeting.

NICOLAS CABALLERO:

Thank you so much for that, US, Susan. And I can see your Spanish is improving a lot. So, thank you for that. Again, welcome everyone. I didn't forget to introduce my distinguished vice chairs, Zeina Bou Harb from Lebanon and Mr. Nigel Hickson from the UK. I assume Francis Olivier Cubahiro from Burundi is around. Mr. Ola Bergström from Sweden should be around as well. No? Oh, I'm sorry. Okay, and I see Christine Arida and Tiago Dal Toe from Colombia. Christine Arida from Egypt. Of course, Manal Ismail, our beloved former GAC chair. And I'm not forgetting anybody, right? And Wang Lang from China.

I'm sorry, I haven't seen Wang Lang yet. Ah, he's online. All right, he's online. So, thank you so much. So, let's have a quick review of the agenda for this session. Sorry about this. So, we're going to have some highlights that I will give you myself a little bit later. Then we'll have a review of the meeting logistics by ICANN GAC support staff. Madam Gulten, or I assume it would be Julia, we'll see. Then we'll have the tour de table for in-person and remote GAC participants. And then I'll give you some news right at the end.

Can we move on to the next slide, please? So, I'm not going to go into details here. We have already seen and reviewed and discussed, as a matter of fact, this blog schedule. You have all the information there.



One notable thing to mention here is our reception, which will be happening tomorrow in this room. We're going to be celebrating, as I said before, and as Susan also pointed out, our 25th anniversary. We'll be here for some toasts and some, exactly, and a small celebration.

Do we have any questions so far? Everything all right with the blog schedule? We had enough time to discuss this, but just in case, it's always good to ask. If not, please, let's move on to the next slide, please. So, these are the agenda highlights I wanted to mention. The ICANN79 Community Forum theme, which as you already know, again, I wouldn't like to repeat everything, but we'll be having meetings with the board, with the ALAC, with the ASO, ccNSO, and so on and so forth.

The NomCom as well, and the contracted parties, which, if I recall correctly, didn't have the chance to do in the last two or three ICANN meetings. Then we'll discuss some priority policy topics like DNS Abuse, as Susan also mentioned before, registration data and new gTLD next round issues, and so on and so forth. Also, as Susan pointed out, we'll have the capacity development workshop, which is now under core meeting week umbrella, so to say, and we have those sessions today. And as a matter of fact, I will be here at least at the beginning.

And I apologize beforehand for not being able to stay for the whole three or four sessions that we will have today, given the fact that I have to be with the board in all the meetings, but I'll join at the very end of the day, which is the session for the HLGM agenda preparation session for the HLGM in Rwanda, in Kigali, right at the end of the sessions today. Another highlight I would like to point out now is the strategic planning session that is scheduled, I think it's at the end of the day tomorrow.

Yeah, at the end of the day tomorrow, right before the 25th anniversary celebration. Another interesting, and this is something where we're trying out this time, let's see how it goes.

If it goes well, we'll keep it, otherwise we'll see, which is the open microphone listening session. This is as you can see, an experimental endeavor. Let's see how it goes. Hopefully everything will be all right, but it would be an interesting exercise to be able to listen not only from the different constituencies, but the public in general. Even though we run the risk of discussing many, many different topics that might not have everything to do with the DNS. We don't know, but maybe that's an advantage, maybe not. We'll see, but in any case, we're trying it out. And then we'll dive into the communiqué development.

There's some flexibility on the, initial session overviews as, as we are fitting in the ICANN, fitting in the ICANN compliance team on Monday. And as I mentioned, like twice already, the acknowledgement of the GAC 25 years in ICANN, which we'll be celebrating on Sunday. We have a couple of surprises there. You'll see on Sunday, apart from the toasts and drinks, we'll have a surprise for you. So, with that, can you move on to the next slide, please, Gülten? I will give the floor to Gülten, as a matter of fact. Over to you, Gülten.

GULTEN TEPE:

Thank you, Nico. Hello again, everyone. This is Gülten for the record. I will bore you with overview of logistics, a bit of technical details and housekeeping rules. This might be helpful for our new community members and a good refresher for the experienced GAC participants. During the roll calls before each session, we mentioned that in-person

And ICANN org implements a very comprehensive plan to ensure a safe and productive meeting.

GULTEN TEPE: Waleed, you're next on the queue.

WALEED ALORINY: Hello, everyone. This is Waleed Aloriny, GAC representative of Saudi

Arabia. Looking forward for fruitful discussion with you, guys. Thank

you very much.

GULTEN TEPE: Slava, you're next in the queue.

VIACHESLAV EROKHIN: Good morning, colleagues. My name is Viacheslav Erokhin. I'm an

alternative GAC representative from the Russian Federation.

GULTEN TEPE: And we have Mohamed from GAC Malaysia next.

MOHAMAD AFIQ AMMAR: Hello. Good morning, good afternoon, good evening, everyone. My

name is Afiq Ammar, speaking on behalf of GAC Malaysia. I would like

to take this opportunity to thank the host country for having and

organizing this ICANN79 meeting. It is unfortunate that we could not

participate in person this time due to other commitments. But

regardless, it is fantastic to continue joining the discussion with all of

you and forward to a productive discussion throughout the week and

learning from all of your diverse perspectives. Thank you.

GULTEN TEPE: And we have Amparo from Dominican Republic on the line.

AMPARO ARANGO: I'm Amparo Arango. I represent the Dominican Republic, the GAC.

Unfortunately, I was not able to join you in person, but I wish you, success. Enjoy coffee and mofongo, and I will be following the

discussions throughout the week. Thank you.

GULTEN TEPE: And next in the queue is Mistura Aruna from Nigeria.

MISTURA ARUNA: Good morning, everyone. This is Mistura from Nigeria, part of GAC

delegation. You will all see me soon. Thank you.

GULTEN TEPE: And that concludes our remote participants. Thank you all.

NICOLAS CABALLERO: Thank you very much, Gulten. Thank you, everyone. Did everybody

have the chance to introduce himself or herself? Hello. I'm sorry. Go

ahead, please, Iran. Go ahead.

KAVOUSS ARASTEH:

Yes. Good morning, good afternoon, good evening to everybody. It is a pity that I could not attend the meeting in person. I applied for visa two months ago. Many documents have been asked and all of them put at the disposal of the embassy. I had the letter from ICANN traveling constituency. I had the invitation letter from Mr. Pablo Rodriguez. They have asked me many information. Last thing they asked me to provide the original of my military service 60 years ago. I was sorry that I was not in a position to provide the original document of 60 years ago.

Then I went to my embassy and they give certificate that I have been exempted. Then they ask another for another time the CV. I send the CV. Then they send me the letter saying that your visa may take weeks and months. That is a standard text. Never replied to my request. Whenever you send a request, a standard text comes that your visa takes months or more than that. But when I want to reply, there is a no reply situation that I could not reply them.

So, it is a pity. I think the invited government need to make every effort to provide visa for the people that they are merited to have the visa. I have been attending many US meetings, many GAC meetings in US before 2016. But after 2016, the rules have been changed. So, I think I miss all of you, the lovely GAC colleagues and lovely ICANN meeting. I'm totally disappointed of this sort of action. I think there should be something from the GAC chair to the ICANN authorities to say that if the person in question does not have any difficulty at all and does not have any problems, visa should be provided in time.

The ticket was prepared. It's cancelled. I went to the burn and paid everything and so on and so forth, waiting and tens of the messages was passed to a table saying that helping you. But the help was that, sorry, we are not in a position to help you. Please talk to the embassy. Talking to the embassy is impossible. One hour and 15 minutes to get in contact. And at the end, the line was interrupted. I'm sorry not to be with you. Thank you.

NICOLAS CABALLERO:

Thank you very much, Iran. Is anybody else missing? And by the way, I'm very sorry to hear that, Iran. We're also deeply disappointed of the fact of not having you here. We will miss you as well, for sure. And we'll try to make sure that next time we'll be able to hopefully help you a little bit more. We have somebody else in the... Yeah, please go ahead, introduce yourself.

KRISTINA HAKOBYAN:

Hello, everyone. Kristina Hakobyan from Armenia, advisor to the Armenian representation and also point of contact to Erdogan. Thank you.

NICOLAS CABALLERO:

Thank you very much, Armenia. Anybody else? Over there, please. Go ahead.

TESSIE LEVA:

My name is Tessie, one of the delegations from Papua New Guinea.

NICOLAS CABALLERO:

Thank you, Papua New Guinea. And I don't see anybody else. Gulten, do we have anybody online? No? So, so far, so good. So, as you can see, this is a very simple exercise in which we just identify ourselves, we give our names and who we represent for the sake of transparency, as I mentioned during my opening speech. Transparency is a very important thing, not only for governments, but to every other member of the multi-stakeholder model.

We'll be discussing about that a little bit later. I don't want to get ahead of myself. But again, I want to put emphasis on the very concept of transparency especially in terms of who you represent, country, constituency, or business, maybe, which is fine, you know. But so again, for the sake of transparency, it's always good, to be extremely clear about the whole thing. So, thank you again. Can we move on to the next slide, please, Gulten? So, I just wanted to mention some GAC transitions, as you can see there, there are 28 new GAC participants since Hamburg, since our last meeting last October in Hamburg. 20, that's a high turnover, I would say.

And we're, we also said goodbye to 38 GAC colleagues, also since October, since ICANN78. I don't see Loreen Capin, my good friend from the USA, from the PSWG group co-chair. I made a mistake and I sent an email, I think it was the day before yesterday or something, saying goodbye, because I thought she was leaving, actually, the GAC and the US delegation and everything. But I'm very happy to learn that she will be with us, and she will be around, not as the co-chair, but she will still be with the US delegation. And also, I would like to welcome Gabriel

Andrews from the USA, as well as the PSWG co-chair. Is he in the room, by the way? I haven't seen him. Anyways, welcome, Gabe.

Also, I want to say thank you to Pua Hunter, I assume she's not here, from the Cook Islands. She served as the co-chair of the underserved regions working group. I'm not sure, maybe she retired, is that correct? She retired, right? So, we'll miss her big time. We also said goodbye to Gabriela Mataus from Argentina, the Argentina GAC representative. And welcome to the new Argentina representative. A warm welcome to you.

MARINA FLEGO EIRAS:

Thank you so much.

NICOLAS CABALLERO:

Nico speaking. We will have a chance to speak when the Spanish speaking group will meet in the afternoon. So, welcome, really welcome.

MARINA FLEGO EIRAS:

Thank you so much.

NICOLAS CABALLERO:

A big thank you to Jorge Cancio from Switzerland, the next round's topic lead and GNSO point of contact, who's here and who also was kind enough to take the floor in Spanish. And finally, welcome to the next round's small group team. We're going to have more details on that tomorrow. So, at this point, let me check with Rob and Gulten. Do we have any housekeeping details you would like to share at this point? I

assume Benedetta is going to give us some very valuable information. Is that correct, Rob? Please go ahead.

ROB HOGGARTH:

Thank you, Nico. Yes, you noted earlier in your remarks about the flexibility of talking a bit about the communique. You've moved some things around, but noting that we've got about 10 minutes, Benedetta is going to offer a brief introduction on what's been transpiring to date and what the plan is for pulling the communique together this week. This seems like an ideal opportunity. Thanks.

NICOLAS CABALLERO:

Thank you so much for that, Rob. And my apologies again. I forgot to introduce, the GAC support staff. Rob Hogarth over there, with his fabulous five team, made up of Benedetta Rossi right to my left. There's also Madame Julia Charvolen. I assume she's online. Fabienne Betremieux, who's also online. Gulten Tepe Oksuzoglu. I hope I'm pronouncing your last name well, Gulten. Thumbs up. Good. Oksusoglu. Is that correct? And I hope I'm not forgetting anybody. I mentioned the fabulous five, right? So--,

ROB HOGGARTH:

Thank you, Nico. We'll also be joined by additional support members this week because we don't have Julia in person. Our friends Christian and Dan will also be helping us out from the policy support team. Thank you.

NICOLAS CABALLERO:

Perfect. Thank you so much. I forgot to mention Daniel Gluck, our good friend from GAC staff. So, with that, let me give the floor to Benedetta for some housekeeping details. Benedetta, please go ahead.

BENEDETTA ROSSI:

Thank you very much, Nico. And my name is Benedetta. I'm from the GAC support team. I think we're waiting for some slides to go up. Oh, there we go. If we go to the next slide, please. Right. Thank you. That's the timeline for the communiqué development. We thought we'd take advantage of this time to just quickly go through this. You can see that there was a communiqué preparation phase which preceded the meeting.

We're now on, well, ahead of time, actually, because we were looking at Monday as the communiqué process introduction, which we're doing today. We'll then on Tuesday, so the meeting day four, we'll have the first plenary sessions with communiqué drafting session one and two. Throughout all of the GAC plenary sessions, GAC members will be encouraged to consider topics to include in the communiqué. So, during each plenary session, we'll try to find moments for you to flag any items that you would like to include in the communiqué.

And on Wednesday, there will be three more sessions for communiqué drafting. And drafters of the communiqué text will be encouraged at any stage of the communiqué development to use the GAC support team as a resource to research any precedent, ensure accuracy of references and consistency with usual practice for the communiqué as needed. So, please don't hesitate to reach out for that if you're considering drafting any text for the communiqué. And then the GAC

chair will decide normally around Wednesday evening to close the live collaboration on the document in the interest of clarity and stability in the text. And then on Thursday, we're looking at two more sessions to draft the communiqué. And then there will be a 72-hour communiqué review period after the communiqué closes.

This has been practiced since the initial hybrid meetings that we've been having. And if we can go to the next slide, please. Yeah, so here we have more information on the timeline. I don't think that we need to really focus on this. I think I've already covered that. So, if we just go to the next slide, you can see here just an example of the usual practice for the Google document that we use for the communiqué.

Please make sure that you're in suggesting mode if you include any text and that you identify yourself and the government that you represent just for the sake of Nico when he goes through the communiqué. Then propose your text where appropriate and don't forget to hit reply. Otherwise, your edits will not be identified. And I think that's pretty much it. I don't know if Nico, if you have anything that you would like to add on the process.

NICOLAS CABALLERO:

Not really, unless we have any question or comment from the floor or online. Can you go back a little bit, Gulten? One slide or two. There we go. One more slide back. One more, please. There we go. So, this is like an overview. Is everyone okay with this? Anybody has a better idea? Good ideas are always welcome. So, please go ahead. If you have a more efficient system or a better idea, we're very happy to hear. But at that point, the decision by the GAC Chair, as you can see there, will



be based on advancement of drafting to close collaboration on the document for the sake of clarity and stability of that. Otherwise, it will be way too complicated to do anything from that point on. But again, I'm in your hands. If you have a better idea, more than happy to hear. Seeing none.

BENEDETTA ROSSI: Nico, we have Switzerland in the line.

NICOLAS CABALLERO: All right. Go ahead, please, Switzerland.

JORGE CANCIO: Thank you, Nico. Jorge Cancio, Switzerland, for the record. Just to

abound on what you were saying and urging all colleagues to come up

with text as soon as possible, because otherwise it gets a challenge if

we get new text on Wednesday or even Thursday. And as somebody

who's been here for too long time, perhaps, I would really urge

colleagues to get the text they are suggesting as soon as possible on the

Google Doc or circulating it to a list. Thank you. Hope this is helpful.

NICOLAS CABALLERO: Oh, absolutely helpful. Very good point. Thank you for that,

Switzerland. Any other comment or question?

BENEDETTA ROSSI: We have Iran next on the queue.

NICOLAS CABALLERO: Okay, Iran, go ahead, please.

KAVOUSS ARASTEH: Thank you, Chair. Do we know at this stage a very high-level topics that

we have to discuss? If I have missed, I'm sorry, but I wish you know

whether we have some idea the area of which we will start to work.

Thank you.

NICOLAS CABALLERO: Thank you for that, Iran. I don't understand your question. I mean, high

level topics for the high-level government meeting session, you mean?

Or what exactly are you referring to, Kavouss? Please go ahead.

KAVOUSS ARASTEH: I don't refer to high level government. I said that topics at the very top

level which are the topics that we are interested to commence or to

start drafting something. Do we have an idea of that before? Thank

you.

NICOLAS CABALLERO: Thank you for that, Iran. Yes, as a matter of fact, we do. We discussed

that during our last agenda setting calls. I'm very happy to have Rob or

Gulten to send you an email with the content. Gulten, would you please

send Iran a copy of the agenda items for, I assume you're asking for the

whole week, Iran? Is that correct?

KAVOUSS ARASTEH:

I'm sorry. I was misunderstood. I'm not asking agenda. I understood you at your previous agenda setting. You had some ideas of the topics on which we would like to have communicate. That is my question. Which are the topics on which we would expect it to start working for drafting communique? Just communique. I'm not talking of agenda.

NICOLAS CABALLERO:

Thank you for that, Iran. Sorry for my misunderstanding. Now I understand you're referring to the communique. So, for that, Rob, please go ahead.

ROB HOGGARTH:

Thank you, Kavouss and Nico. As one of Benedetta's slides showed, there is, and on the slide you've got, there's a communique preparation phase that the committee has worked to develop over the course of the pandemic. And now as you've returned to hybrid meetings, the chair sends out an initial email that was done back on the 19th of February, asking for members to identify issues that they anticipated including in the communique.

Then as many of you will recall, Nico sends out a second email asking for additional information on key messages or GAC advice text. I think, correct me if I'm wrong, Benedetta in person or Fabienne online, that we don't have any issues identified yet. So, the short answer to you, Kavouss, is there are none yet. The hope is that by having this presentation here during the opening plenary session, that will inspire,

motivate, or encourage those of you who are anticipating presenting issues or identifying topics to please do so at your earliest opportunity. As I indicated in the chat, either Benedetta or Fabienne will shortly be resharing with you the link to the Google collaboration document. And that will enable you all to start entering at the very least topics. If you're not comfortable doing that, please just indicate your topics or other areas of interest on the GAC email list. And we will be more than happy to incorporate those into the document. Thanks very much.

NICOLAS CABALLERO:

Thank you for that, Rob. So, Iran, sorry again for the misunderstanding. So, the short answer will be no communique topics identified yet. Any other comment or question at this point? We're getting close to the end of the session.

BENEDETTA ROSSI:

We have Iran next.

NICOLAS CABALLERO:

All right. Go ahead, please, Iran.

KAVOUSS ARASTEH:

Thank you, Chair. I think perhaps maybe you may recall or encourage that distinguished GAC colleagues present or remote provide topic or list of topics that they wish to be discussed as a candidate for the communique. That would be beneficial to everybody. Thank you.

NICOLAS CABALLERO:

Thank you for that, Iran. Any other comment or question. If not, that brings us to the end of the session. Thank you so much again. And as a matter of fact, I'm very happy to have my Paraguay GAC representative here. You know, I was feeling a little bit alone, so I'm a little happier now that I have my compatriot here with me. So, Ignacio Velasquez over there, can you wave or something? Thank you, Ignacio. So, with that, let's have a break. We'll reconvene in, is it 15 minutes? 30 minutes, sorry. 30 minutes. We'll have a 30-minute break. More than happy to share some cappuccino with you and, for some corridor talks. Welcome again. Let's have a break. Thank you.
